Content: The manners and morals of the nation revealed through its Public Discourse. We will deal with public address from 1607 to 2014. The course will consist of lectures and discussions about the ongoing rhetorical construction of American life and culture. It will be arranged around a series of debates: Debate on how to justify the establishment of a nation; Debate on how to govern the country; Debate on how to finance continental expansion and so on. Debates about monopoly versus dispersed control of key resources will also be an important topic. Debates about the balance between individualism and collectivism, between freedom and order, etc., etc., and more . . .
