SOCL 2501 Current Social Problems (3cr) Section 2 with Dr. Skylar Gremillion,

TTH 1:30-2:50, In Person - 115 North Hall 40 seats.

This is a General Education Course for Social Science. Sociological analysis of major social problems in contemporary society; focus on both the institutional and personal causes and consequences. This class will focus on reading critical articles about modern social issues and will have a significant discussion component.

**CMST 1061.4 Fundamentals of Communication (3cr) Section 4 with Prof. Joni Butcher,
MWF 9:30-10:20am, In Person 35 seats.**

This is a General Education course for Humanities. The practice of rhetoric, performance studies and communication theory; extensive practical and performance applications of communication skills in addition to lectures and readings.

**POLI 2057 Introduction to International Politics (3cr) Section 4 with Dr. Tirone,
T/Th 10:30-11:50, In Person Shadow section 30 seats.**

This is a General Education course for Social Science. Basic principles, problems and concepts of international politics; evolution and nature of the nation-state; concepts of sovereignty, power and national interest; patterns of conflict and cooperation; foreign policies of the major powers.

**PSYC 2000 Introduction to Psychology (3cr) Section 4 with Dr. Raymond Tucker,
ONLINE. Shadow section 30 seats.**

This is a General Education course for Social Science. Understanding, prediction and control of human behavior. Here are some fun questions you will be able to answer by the end of the class:

- If Dwight Schrute came to a therapist's office, what would he likely be diagnosed with?
- Should I really limit my "screen time" before bed?
- Should I trust Facebook/Twitter when I see a post that says, "science shows that people..."?
- Why is it that I can remember the name of my first-grade teacher but not what I studied for class last week?

**SPAN 1102 Elementary Spanish (4cr) Section 22 with Prof. Isabel Matus,
TWTHTF 12:30- 1:20 ONLINE 25 Seats.**

This is a General Education course for Humanities. [Prereq.: SPAN 1050 or SPAN 1101 or equivalent. Credit will not be given for this course and SPAN 1152.] Supplementary work in the language laboratory. Basic lexicon and structure of Spanish; emphasis on communicative language use.

BIOL 1002 General Biology (3cr) Section 1 with Prof. Nabanita Bhattacharyya,

MWF 9:30-10:20, ONLINE Shadow Section 40 Seats.

This is a General Education course for Natural Sciences/Life Science . Prereq.: BIOL 1001 or BIOL 1201. Diversity, interactions and life histories of microorganisms, fungi, plants and animals.

MATH 1100 The Nature of Mathematics (3cr) Section 1 with Prof. Elizabeth Dougherty,

TTH 12:00-1:20, [ONLINE Shadow Section 50 Seats.](#)

This is a General Education course for Analytical Reasoning. For students who desire an exposure to mathematics as part of a liberal education. Logic; the algebra of logic, computers and number systems; networks and combinations; probability and statistics.

SOCL 2001 Introductory Sociology (3cr) Section 9 with Prof. Skylar Gremillion, TTH 10:30-11:50, 115 North Hall.

This is a General Education Course. Major subject areas and principles of sociology.

HIST 1001 Western Civilization to 1500 (3) Section 4 with Dr. Erin Halloran, TTH 1:30-2:50, 115 North Hall.

This is a General Education Course. The main emphasis is on Classical Greece and Rome; Christianity and its roots in Jewish religion/society; the Mediterranean after the Roman Empire; emergence of Western European states in the Middle Ages. Along with lecture presentations there are assigned readings in the textbook and primary source documents available on the course website.

POLI 2057 Introduction to International Politics (3cr) Section 1 with Dr. Mokeba, MWF 9:30-10:20, 115 North Hall.

This is a General Education course. Basic principles, problems and concepts of international politics; evolution and nature of the nation-state; concepts of sovereignty, power and national interest; patterns of conflict and cooperation; foreign policies of the major powers.
