### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

**CMST 2064 Small Group Communication.** (3) Aspects of group leadership; group discussion and the problems of communication in human relations

In this course, we will study how to work effectively in groups by focusing on communication components: creating workable goals, the stages of group development, task and social maintenance roles, membership diversity, leadership, motivation, listening, conflict resolution, problem solving, critical thinking and argumentation, planning and conducting meetings, and issues of ethical behavior.

### MAJOR ASSIGNMENTS AND ACTIVITIES

## 1. Exams (55% of final grade)

Exams 1 and 2 (20% each) will be objective tests of your comprehension of material primarily from the textbook and lectures. The textbook includes tools for helping you with the material including the Chapter Outline at the beginning of each chapter and the Summary Study Guide at the end. The Final Exam (15%) may also include an essay section.

### 2. Attendance, participation, and other assignments (15%)

In addition to participating in exercises and activities, you will observe and evaluate the presentations of other groups. DO NOT use technology or engage in other activities during class time for personal reasons (unrelated to the class). Cell phones and other devices should be silent and not disruptive. For most activities, you will receive full credit if you are here and participate. Some assignments will be graded on a 0-100% scale.

Five points will be deducted from this grade for each unexcused absence. Please see the university guidelines, PS-22, for class attendance policies and valid reasons for absences. I understand that emergencies may occur on days when you have responsibilities in class. If this happens, please contact your group members and me as soon as possible so that we can discuss the situation.

You will also submit assignments for a few out-of-class activities including a social activity with your group and an analysis of a movie or TV program.

### 3. Group Work: Problem-Solving Discussion (15%)

You will be assigned to work with three or four classmates at the beginning of the semester and stay

with this group throughout the term. Your first major assignment will be to participate in a problem-solving discussion. You will individually (and collectively) do research on a significant and controversial issue with the goal of identifying a solution for it. You may choose from topics provided or, with approval, select a different topic. Each group will have a different topic. As a final step in the process, you and your teammates will hold a problem-solving discussion *in class*. Evaluation will be based on the quality of your group discussion, including how well you followed the Standard Agenda. Your grade will also be based on your individual contribution and peer evaluation.

## 4. Group Work: Group Video and Presentation (15%)

For this assignment, your group will develop and create an informative and entertaining video about a topic relevant to small group communication. In addition to the video, the group will submit a storyboard, a script, and a set of three multiple-choice questions based on information presented in the video. The group will also do a formal presentation in which each member talks for 3-5 minutes about some component of the group project. The talks should be informative, well-prepared, and rehearsed. One member will serve as a moderator, introducing each speaker and his or her topic. The moderator will also invite questions from the audience.

Evaluation of the overall group will be based on (1) how informative and interesting the video is (grades will *not* be based on the technical quality of the production unless the video was done haphazardly and at the last minute) and (2) the quality and cohesiveness of the group presentation. Individual grades will be adjusted according to individual contributions, peer evaluation, and quality of the individual's presentation.

### RESPONSIBLE GROUP PARTICIPATION

As most students are aware, group projects can be challenging. One of the biggest problems occurs when members do not put similar time and effort into the outcome. Some members are highly engaged, even to the point that they take over the process. Other members may slack off. For the group work in this class, your grade will reflect the performance of the overall group as well as your individual effort. One of your responsibilities will be to provide feedback about individual contributions to the group project.

If your group includes members whose participation does not meet expectations, you should engage in open communication by dealing with each other tactfully and directly, either individually or as a group. After your conversation, if participation has not improved sufficiently, you should bring the problem to my attention. Group members whose work is significantly sub-standard may be counseled, disciplined, and/or removed from the group (thereby receiving a "0" on the assignment) (adapted from Dr. Amy Fannin).

Grades will be recorded in Moodle - you should check it regularly to make sure it is accurate. You must notify me of any problem within three days of grades being recorded. Missing grades will be counted as "zero."
